Message from the President

Thank you for your interest in the G30 Program at Nagoya University. I invite you to apply to our institution and meet other students addressing the world's most significant problems. Why study at Nagoya University? Your career goals might be consistent with the fundamental objectives of our Academic Charter. First, we support all faculty and students so they can engage in the highest levels of research. In 2014, two of our colleagues, Professor Amano and Professor Emeritus Akasaki, received the Nobel Prize in Physics for their inquiries that contributed to the development of the Blue Light-Emitting-Diode. Second, we provide students with an exemplary education because of our small class sizes and insistence on practical training and research skills. Third, we aim to improve society. As I noted, our faculty members developed the Blue LED in a laboratory on our campus. Today, billions of people in every country use this technology in smartphones, television screens, and energy-efficient light bulbs. Finally, Nagoya University continues to expand its networks abroad and build a global campus at home. More of our Japanese students are studying overseas and taking classes in English, and we are increasing the number of international students from a diverse variety of countries. I hope you will join us as we pursue making Nagoya University a place where everyone can develop into what we call a "courageous intellectual," a person unafraid to pursue the goals of inquiry and scholarship and a person committed to making the world a better place.


About Nagoya University



The origins of Nagoya University date back to its founding as a medical school in 1871. By 1947, the Japanese Government had revised its status to a national university. Today it is a comprehensive university with more than 10,000 undergraduate and 6000 graduate students studying subjects in the Sciences, Engineering, Social Sciences and Humanities. Every year, on average, approximately 1,700 international students are enrolled and 1,000 foreign researchers are welcomed. As a world-class center of research and education, Nagoya University continues to contribute to the accumulation of knowledge and the betterment of society.






Financial Expenses

As a national university, Nagoya University receives much of its funding from the Japanese government. Therefore, tuition fee is the same for all students regardless of nationality. Although some areas of Japan are known for their high cost of living, Nagoya remains affordable.

Tuition exemption scheme (applicable after enrollment)*


More than 60% of our graduates chose to further their studies. As graduates from the research intensive programs, they advanced to worldwide renowned universities.


